How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

- gender imbalances
- pupils with additional support needs
- placing of siblings

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Promoting Positive Behaviour:

It is the aim of the school to create a happy relaxed yet purposeful atmosphere in which children can develop self-discipline, consideration for others and concern for the fabric of the school. Our children are supervised throughout the day and there is always an adult available should children want to discuss any concerns or worries. Staff have consistent clear and high expectations of pupils with regard to acceptable behaviour. The school recognises the vital part to be played by co-operation between home and school. Should behavioural difficulties arise, an early referral to parents will be made and possible courses of action will be explored together, in such cases, the full support of parents is expected to ensure the child conforms to the behaviour norms of the school. If, in the rare and serious event when all else fails, Authority Policy regarding exclusion will be followed.

Celebrating Successes:

During assemblies we congratulate the 'Pupil of the Week' and 'King / Queen of Bee-haviour' with a certificate for each award. We have three houses: Cairn (blue), Criffel (red) and Solway (green). Each child gains credit for academic, social, physical and creative achievements throughout the week and these are converted into points. Assemblies are an opportune time for the whole school to recognise personal achievements of pupils both inside and outside school.

School uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. For more information on School Uniform, Dress Code, and School Clothing Grants visit www.dumgal.gov.uk

This code must not lead to direct or indirect discrimination on the grounds of race, religion, gender, poverty or disability. The expectation is that parents will be supportive of the dress code.

Clothing which is unacceptable, would include items which:

- Could potentially encourage factions (eg football colours).
- Could cause offence (eg anti-religious or political slogans).
- Could cause health and safety difficulties
- Are of flammable materials which may be a danger in certain classes.
- Could cause damage to floors.
- Carry advertising, in particular for alcohol or tobacco.
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils.

Financial Support for Children and Families

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Free Travel for 5 - 22 year olds

From 31 January 2022 all children and young people aged 5-22 will be entitled to free bus travel in Scotland. You can apply for free travel online from today at www.getyournec.scot (This cannot be done through your school)

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

There are detailed Experiences and Outcomes for all subjects available on the Education Scotland website; teachers work to deliver these, and the progress of learners is measured in the achievement of Outcomes. Reporting to parents includes information about children's Experiences and Outcomes and the Levels at which they are working.

At Brownhall we encourage pupils to take part in a variety of activities. The number of volunteers to lead them defines the scope for these extra activities. School staff, Active Schools and parents/friends of the school who have been PVG checked give their time and talents generously to provide pupils with opportunities in a variety of activities.

We endeavour to take the pupils out with the school on a regular basis to extend their education. We are fortunate to have a wealth of educationally rich resources in the near vicinity. We aim to take pupils to appropriate venues to support the Interdisciplinary learning programme of topics.

We also encourage visitors to come into school to enhance the curriculum. We have had drama and storytelling groups and science workshops. We also have regular visits from the emergency services: Fire Brigade and Police. We attempt to provide a residential experience for senior pupils on a biannual basis. We visit Manor Adventure at Lockerbie along with pupils from other small schools and Caerlaverock Primary. On these visits we aim to foster team building, social skills and empathy. Pupils have great fun and take part in a selection of outdoor education activities.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Purposes/Aims of Home Learning

- To continue to build on prior learning that has taken place in school
- To encourage each child to develop his/her skills in various contexts out with the classroom
- To provide an opportunity for parents to become more involved in their child's learning
- To foster good home/school working relations which benefit each child's development

The amount and frequency of home learning will vary throughout the year, and will be managed by the teacher, with regard to the needs of the children and home setting. Parents are encouraged to seize this opportunity to

work alongside their children and learn more about their child's knowledge, skills and abilities. Effective two way communication is essential; please make contact with the school to discuss further with a member of staff.

This session we are focusing on opportunities to invite parents/carers into school for an informal 'Brownhall Blether'. We will use themes or topics that are requested by parents/carers to chat about in order to support families with their child's learning.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

Closing the Gap

- Needs will be identified as early as possible to allow us to tailor interventions.
- Staged interventions will be tailored to the needs of each pupil, using a range of assessment data.
- Parents will be confident in how to support and/ or challenge their child appropriately.

Building shared standards and expectations in Literacy and Numeracy:

- Embedding the tracking will ensure consistency and clear picture of coverage and next steps for all learners.
- Increase staff confidence in assessing aspects of literacy and numeracy through focused assessments and holistic assessments.
- Staged interventions will be tailored to the needs of each pupil, using a range of assessment data.
- Build parental confidence in supporting their child.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
