Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

At Nethermill Primary, we aim to create a relaxed, safe and happy environment where we care about one another's wellbeing, learning and achievements.

We pride ourselves in being a nurturing school. We adopt a positive, nurturing behaviour approach across our school. Learners are engaged in the design of classroom and school rules through their class charters and we have consistently high expectations of their behaviours. We regularly share strategies to support the children in school and engage in purposeful, solution focused discussions when they face difficulties. Emotion Works is also used across our school to enhance emotional literacy for everyone. We are currently a Bronze Rights Respecting School and are working towards our Silver Rights Respecting School Award.

Learners have many opportunities for achievement beyond the school day. We run various after school clubs throughout the year to cater for all of our pupil's interests and needs. We seek the views of our pupils to try and offer a wide range of activities that they enjoy or would like to experience. Pupils are also encouraged to share successes from home so we can celebrate these at our whole school assemblies or through school communications.

School uniform

At Nethermill Primary we encourage all children to wear school uniform as it encourages a sense of unity, pride and belonging across the school. The uniform consists of a blue jumper/cardigan, blue polo-shirt and dark coloured trousers/skirt.

We work hard to -

- Encourage sports clothes for PE and Outdoor Learning days.
- Wear wellies for Forest Schools.
- Discourage wearing football shirts to prevent factions.
- All pupils are provided with waterproofs at school to enable all to access Outdoor Learning

We also run 'Swap Shops' for pre-worn uniforms that have been handed in to school to help families with the Cost of Living.

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Free Travel for 5 - 22 year olds

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher. We ensure our curriculum provides all learners with breadth, challenge and application of skills across all subject areas. Health and well-being is central to our learning and our nurture approach supports the development of our learners. We ensure we identify and, wherever possible, remove barriers to learning, providing necessary supports and challenges to allow learners to achieve and often exceed their learning potential.

Literacy, Numeracy and Health and Wellbeing are inter-woven throughout the curriculum and staff provide rich contexts for learning. The children are involved in the design and direction of their learning each term and help plan the Inter-Disciplinary Learning activities collaboratively with their class teachers. Staff are continuously involved in selfevaluating the learning process to ensure all children are achieving their expected targets. Children are involved in this process across the school year and set these targets regularly with their class teacher. They also plan and deliver Skills Groups weekly to enhance experiences and develop new skills.

At Nethermill, we believe that there is a need for each child to be able to learn at their own pace, with enough challenge and support to stretch them. Using Curriculum for Excellence, our curriculum is joined up from 3-18 years and is built on previous learning, making connections between subjects to help make sense of the world and it has more focus on knowledge and skills. Wider achievements are celebrated across the school and we aim to provide a wide range of extra-curricular activities to enhance our learner's experiences.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Homework is most effective when supported by parents/carers and also when a routine is formed to encourage a 'homework time'. Once this is established it can defuse any conflict over when homework is done. We always encourage our learners to try their best in homework tasks and to share their learning at home. Any homework set is part of a planned programme of work and is there to consolidate learning that is happening in school. Homework tasks are usually set at the start of the week with specific dates for return to allow for some flexibility around when to complete.

Learning Conversations are discussions that teachers have with the learner and their families (in November and May) to talk about successes in learning, to set targets to work on and discuss next steps. Reports are then sent home as a record which include both parent/carer and pupil views.

We provide Open Days and information sessions throughout the year where families are encouraged to come into school and find out about what their child is learning and how best to support this at home. The children also lead assemblies to showcase skills and knowledge they have developed.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

We share a parent/carer friendly overview with our families every year and look forward to working with our whole school



community throughout the session to work towards achieving our priorities.

Our Improvement Priorities this year are focussed on:

- Increasing Parental Involvement and Engagement through consultations, ensuring parents are supported and represented, open days, strong relationships and using Seesaw. These also reflect our RRS. Digital Literacy. This will be through embedding throughout the curriculum, reflecting on planning, staff training and working towards digital schools award.
- Inclusive Learning. This will be further delivered through training of staff in 'Respect Me', Inclusive Practice Leads in schools and reflection through Education Scotland as well as Boxall Profiling.
- Developing Number Knowledge. Development of this within the school planning and training. Adapting DNK across the cluster and reference too DNK strategies in the classroom.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
