How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Head Teacher to organise the class structure.

Shawhead School currently has one Partnership Head Teacher, a Principal Teacher, a part time teacher, and a probationer teacher. The children are separated into a P1-3 class and a P4-7 class. Whilst they have a main class teacher, all pupils will be taught by all class teachers at some time in the week/term. The children will be in different groups for different subjects depending on the Curriculum for Excellence level they are working at. These groupings will change as pupils develop at their own pace.

Composite Class Size Policy

There are national and local agreements in Dumfries and Galloway about class sizes in primary school. Under present arrangements, class sizes are determined by the number of pupils on the school roll and the finance available for staffing. Currently no single-age class should be greater than 30 in P1, P2 and P3 nor greater than 33 in P4-P7. No composite class should be greater than 25

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Shawhead School is a very nurturing and inclusive school, where every member of the team is valued and their achievements are shared and celebrated. We share successes and involvements, from both in and out of school, daily and weekly. All the pupils in the school are part of a Pupil Voice group and their work in these groups has led to the whole school achieving success in national awards; for example, we are the proud holders of a 7th Green Flag from Eco Schools Scotland, we have a Platinum Green Tree Schools Award, we have a Silver Sports Scotland Award and are a UNICEF Silver Rights Respecting School. These achievements are valued by all the members of the team and allow everyone to achieve, and celebrate success.

We work hard to build positive relationships across the school and these positive relationships allow us to take a restorative approach in encouraging positive behaviour. We have a clear set of agreed school rules made with our staff and pupils – a school charter which help our youngsters make positive decisions about their behaviour.

- We care for each other
- We are kind and helpful and include everyone
- We are honest and listen to each other
- We bring in healthy snacks
- We work hard and always try our best

Good behaviour is expected and promoted. We are a KiVa school, which means we follow a clear antibullying programme where the children have a good understanding of what bullying is and how to deal with it, should bullying occur.

As we are a Rights Respecting School, the children create their own class charter, based on their rights as set out in the UNCRC.

School uniform

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

Shawhead School aims to ensure that all learners' progress at their own pace and so differentiates learning to allow individual achievement. Pupil progress and achievement is monitored carefully so that support can be offered to learners at appropriate points to ensure continued progress.

At Shawhead School, we are keen that our pupils experience a wide range of learning opportunities to ensure they are able to develop skills and knowledge in a manner that suits them best. We are keen to develop independent pupil-led learning in the school. Outdoor Learning offers a wide variety of opportunities for pupil-led learning as well as providing challenge and an opportunity to apply skills and knowledge gained in the classroom. We are committed to developing our Outdoor Learning at Shawhead, and so provide a wide range of learning contexts and opportunities.

Pupils also develop skills and knowledge through their work in their Pupil Voice group and through a variety of whole school activities and enterprises, such as planning and performing school shows, hosting community lunches and taking part in sporting events.

The school has a focus on Literacy, Numeracy and Health and Wellbeing, as these vital skills are the foundation of all other learning. As part of Literacy and Languages, French is taught from P1 to P7 as a second language and Spanish is being introduced as a third language to P5 to P7. Digital skills are embedded into our curriculum, with laptops and iPads being used as a part of learning in most lessons. Pupils develop digital skills as part of their Interdisciplinary Learning.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

From time to time the school will set regular homework tasks for the pupils which reflects the breadth of the curriculum. This keeps parents informed about on-going school work and gives the children the opportunity to develop their skills through extra practice.

Children may also be asked to complete work which has not been finished in class.

From Primary 1, children will usually be set regular reading homework which involves a parent or other responsible adult listening to the child read and discussing the text. Phonic homework, which involves the parent listening for the phonic sound, and practising the writing of the appropriate phonic. Maths homework will only be sent home if it is felt that the pupil would benefit from more consolidation.

From Primary 2, spelling homework may also be given. Learning to spell requires specific skills so the children will be asked to practise these and learn spelling rules and associated words.

To ensure that parents are aware of the homework being set, communication is sent out to parents. We also ask that completed work is signed by a parent or other responsible adult.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
