

Assessment & Moderation Workstream

The assessment and moderation workstream have planned a number of events for after the Christmas break. The aims of these events are:

- Practitioners will have the opportunity to share practice and engage in professional dialogue with colleagues from across the region.
- Through agreement of standards, practitioners will increase their levels of confidence in their professional judgements.
- Practitioners will have the opportunity to build networks across the region.

These events will follow the same format as national moderation events and will be supported by QAMSOs from across the region. A secondary subject event will also be held in May. As we increasingly engage with staff across the region, a number of other themes for collaboration are being identified and will be taken forward in the new year and beyond into session 2020/21.



SWEIC Maths Group

The SWEIC Maths group held a Train the Trainer day in September for Numeracy Champions across the region. A training programme was designed and is currently being delivered during twilights in November and December across the South West. This professional learning focuses on developing Bar Modelling approaches to support children's understanding of mathematics within worded problems and support children in developing number sense. These twilight inputs will provide opportunities for staff to develop pedagogy while reflecting and sharing practice.

Early Years Event – 11th November 2019

The aim of the SWEIC Early Years Event at The Park Hotel in Kilmarnock on November 11th, was to provide an opportunity for consultation and a forum for sharing identified good practice across the SWEIC. Almost 200 practitioners from across all four authorities attended the event.

The keynote speaker was Julia Matthew. Julia is a Quality Improvement Manager for Early Years in Aberdeenshire. In addition to this, she regularly inspects early years settings in England and has worked on a range of other education improvement projects. Julia's passion for early years came through in her address "Just Playing...Don't Get Me Started", which was followed by lively follow-up table discussions.

Nicola Sykes, Senior Education Officer, Community Learning and Development, Parental Engagement and Family Learning from Education Scotland then introduced the policy context for these areas. Nicola then shared a presentation from The National Parent Forum of Scotland before presenting a range of national supports to enhance improvement work across this area. All four authorities were then represented in a range of workshop presentations designed to share interesting practice. The workshops were well received by participants and feedback indicates an appetite for more.

The event closed with a consultation exercise focussing on future collaborative work on quality learning and teaching and parental engagement and family learning with the Early Years sector. Participants were then asked for their views on how the SWEIC can support common priorities and areas of development across the Collaborative within Early Years.









Early Years Event – 11th November 2019

Several common themes emerged from the consultation in terms of SWEIC support and next steps in Early Years collaborative work. These focused on the following areas:

- Facilitation of cross-authority visits to share practice and to encourage greater sharing
- Leadership in the sector to empower at all levels
- A universal way of sharing information for all
- SWEIC led training within authority areas to deliver consistent messages
- Inclusion of partners
- Consultation
- Assessment and Moderation
- Potential for families similar to the model already in place within SWEIC
- Twilight opportunities to ensure participation at all levels
- A consistent approach to paperwork Tracking, Care Plans, Planning etc
- A shared SWEIC vision and values across Early Years

SWEIC officers and Early Years Strategic Leads will consider the results of this consultation and determine a plan for this sector. We look forward to planning how best to address these themes and are extremely grateful for the honest engagement with the consultation exercise on the day.

Parental Engagement and Family Learning

Involving Dads

"Involving fathers in the education of their children is a good thing and yet not systematically done. That fathers' involvement is a good thing has been shown time and again in research and in practice. For instance, fathers' involvement with their children is linked with their higher educational achievement and higher educational and occupational mobility relative to their parents. Father's involvement with 7 and 11 year old children is linked with their better national examination performance at age 16, and their educational attainment at age 20. This is true across all social classes — whether the mother is highly involved too, or not. As well as this, children of involved fathers are more likely to enjoy school and have positive attitudes towards school. They are also less likely to fail a grade, have poor attendance, be suspended or expelled, or have behaviour problems at school"

Parental Engagement and Family Learning - Involving Dads

Men and Their Children, (MATCH)

MATCH is an intergenerational programme open to dads, uncles, grandfathers and male carers, running a few times a year in year at Kelloholm Primary and Sanquhar Primary Schools in Upper Nithsdale. The evening sessions, which are run by Mary-Ann Riddell, Lifelong Learning Coordinator, with support from adult learning staff and volunteers, offer opportunities for dads to contribute their own skills and knowledge and to take a lead in planning and delivering sessions.

Many of the activities are planned around curriculum areas, and include activities such as healthy cooking sessions, digital animation, fun science and trebuchet games. Competitions are also very popular! The Dads' Group not only helps to improve the educational attainment of their children by their involvement but enhances their own personal, educational and social development whilst building new friendships. As Mary-Ann says, new mums can meet other mums and form friendships but there is not much for dads.

To launch the project, and encourage participation, Mary-Ann arranged information sessions at the school and offered a free, framed digital family portrait. The response was overwhelming!




















Evolving Systems Thinking Programme

25 senior leaders from across the South West participated in the first SWEIC cohort of the Evolving Systems Thinking Programme in October. Further modules will be delivered in January and April.

The EST programme has been designed in partnership with the Ontario Principals Council to support system level educators to enhance their leadership skills and experience through national and regional collaborative working, with a strong focus on delivering excellence and equity for all children and young people in Scotland.

The content of the Evolving Systems Thinking Programme is founded on research that points to a clear and powerful connection between effective school-level and system-level leadership practices (Leithwood K, 2013). Understanding what effective schools and school-level leadership looks like is the crucial foundation for delivering effective system-level support and thinking.











RAiSE - STEM CLPL for Primary Science Development Officers

The National Trust for Scotland Countryside Ranger Service (based at Culzean Country Park) and South Ayrshire Council's Outdoor Education Centre, Dolphin House, collaborated to provide an exciting programme of immersive STEM CLPL for Primary Science Development Officers who are part of the tri-funded RAiSE Programme. Practitioners were able to explore quality outdoor STEM activities in a range of environments which could be replicated in their own Local Authorities, from a concrete playground, to managed woodland, as well as exploring the benefits of partnership working and the origins of those relationships.

The residential nature of the programme allowed those who are (or have been) involved in the RAiSE Programme within the collaborative, and elsewhere in Scotland, to share good practice, while developing new skills and pedagogies collaboratively. Particular highlights of the two days included exploring the geology of the caves at Culzean, catching two newts despite it being November (!), comparing different types of chocolate bar to rock types, determining wind direction using bubbles and using charcoal created from a beach fire to sketch field notes. S3 STEM Event



Monday 4th – Thursday 7th November 2019 University of the West of Scotland, Ayr Campus


More than 300 S3 young people from across the South West Educational Improvement Collaborative engaged with a variety of STEM activities which were run by both industry and educational establishments during a four day STEM careers and skills event ran by South Ayrshire Council.

S3 learners were purposely invited to this event in order to support their subject choices in the following year. The University of the West of Scotland campus provided a venue where learners could explore options such as apprenticeships, further study and the world of work, while experiencing a taste of university life.

Each day consisted of a keynote speaker, four workshops and a market place as part of a rotation.

The official opening was undertaken by South Ayrshire Council representatives Councillor William Grant and Provost Helen Moonie.

Young people were asked to identify three of the most informative/enjoyable sessions each day. The overall evaluations for all days show that young people found their day extremely positive with 31% of young people identifying participating in STEM practical workshops as being the most important to them.
