2.2 The Convener of the Board holds office as such for the period beginning on the day after the Convener's election and ending with the day on which the election of Convener is next held following a further election of members of the Board consequent to a local authority election.

- 2.3 The Convener so elected:-
- Is eligible for re-election as Convener of the Board
- May at any time resign by giving notice to the Clerk (a copy of which must be passed to the Council)
- Will cease to be Convener on ceasing to be a member of the Board

2.4 Where there is a vacancy in the office of Convener the Board must, at the first meeting after the vacancy arises, elect one of their members to fill the vacancy.

2.5 Where the Convener is unable to chair any meeting the Board must elect from their number a chairman for that meeting.

2.6 The Convener may be removed from office by the Board. The number of members voting in favour of the decision must exceed one half of the total number of members of the Board.

2.7 If at a meeting of the Board there is an equality of votes on any matter the member chairing the meeting has a casting vote.

3. **RECOMMENDATION**

Members are asked to elect a Convener in terms of the Act for the term until after the next local authority election, who will also chair this meeting.

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LICENSING (SCOTLAND) ACT 2005 (THE ACT): SECTION 74 APPLICATION FOR A PERSONAL LICENCE APPLICANT: CALLAN MALONEY

1. Reason for Report

Callan Maloney submitted an application for a Personal Licence on 31 March 2022. As the Chief Constable has submitted a Notice under section 73(3)(b) of the Act notifying a relevant offence this matter must be determined by the Board at a Hearing.

2. Background

2.1 A Personal Licence, issued by a Licensing Board, authorises the licence holder to supervise or authorise the sale of alcohol.

2.2 The pre-licence conditions that must be met in law before an application can be granted have been met. Namely, that the applicant:

- is aged 18 or over;
- possess a licensing qualification;
- does not already hold a Personal Licence; and
- has not held a Personal Licence that has previously been revoked within the last five years (other than it being revoked for failure to produce to the Board evidence of renewed Personal Licence Holder training)

3. Police Response

In terms of Section 73(1) of the Act, a copy of the application was forwarded to the Chief Constable and, within the 21-day statutory timeline, the Chief Constable responded with a Notice in terms of section 73(3)(b) of the Act notifying a relevant offence (**Appendix**).

4. Determining the application

4.1 As democratically elected individuals, ultimate decision making power rests with elected Members and not Council Officers. Whilst Officers can give advice, they cannot clearly make decisions at Hearings. Ultimately, the Board must come to a lawful decision taking into account the following:

4.2 In terms of Section 74(6) of the Act, the Board must, after having regard to the Chief Constable's Notice:

- (a) if satisfied that a ground of refusal applies, REFUSE the application or
- (b) if not so satisfied, GRANT the application.

4.3 The grounds for refusal are:

- (a) That, having regard to the licensing objectives, the applicant is not a fit and proper person to be the holder of a Personal Licence;
- (b) That it is otherwise necessary to refuse the application for the purposes of any of the licensing objectives (preventing crime and disorder; securing public safety; preventing public nuisance; protecting and improving public health; and protecting children and young persons from harm).

5. Recommendation

Members are asked to either GRANT or REFUSE the application.

In terms of Section 73(3)(b) of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 (the 2005 Act) I give notice that, based upon the information provided and as far as the Chief Constable is aware, the applicant has been convicted of the following relevant offence.

I am unable to confirm the existence of any foreign offence in respect of the applicant.

In terms of Section 73(5) of the 2005 Act the Chief Constable provides the following information in relation to the applicant which is relevant to the Board's consideration of the application:-

On Thursday 3 October 2019 at about 0315 hours Police were tasked to trace a white Volkswagen motor vehicle as it had been suspected that the driver was under the influence of alcohol.

The vehicle was traced a short time later and stopped in Dumfries Town Centre. The driver and sole occupant of the vehicle identified himself as Callan Michael Maloney, who stated he was the owner of the vehicle.

On speaking with Mr Maloney Officers detected a strong smell of alcohol from his breath.

Mr Maloney was asked by Police if he had consumed an alcoholic drink in the past twenty minutes to which he replied no.

He was thereafter required under the term of Section 6 of the Road Traffic Act 1988 to provide a specimen of breath for analysis to which he agreed. He subsequently provided a positive breath test and was thereafter arrested and conveyed to Loreburn Street Police Station, Dumfries. He was thereafter subject to the drink drive procedure by means of an approved device namely the Intoximeter EC/IR eventual breath testing instrument. Mr Maloney provided two specimens of breath as required, the lower of which contacted 39 micrograms of alcohol in 100 millilitres of breath.

At 0357 hours, same date, Mr Maloney was cautioned and charged with Section 5 of the Road Traffic Act 1988. He was thereafter bailed to appear at Dumfries Sheriff Court on Tuesday 29 October 2019.

In light of the above, the Chief Constable considers that it is necessary for the purposes of the securing public safety, protecting members of the public and other road users, that the application be refused. The Chief Constable accordingly makes a recommendation to that effect in terms of section 73(4) of the 2005 Act.

1.1 On 7 April 2022, the Chief Constable, in terms of his power under section 84A the 2005 Act, submitted to the Board a report advising that Demi Leigh Hynes, the holder of a personal licence, has acted in a manner that is inconsistent with the licensing objectives of Preventing Crime and Disorder and Preventing Public nuisance. (**Appendix**).

1.2 When the Board receives a section 84A report it must hold a Hearing.

2. Background

2.1 A Personal Licence issued by a Licensing Board authorises the licence holder to supervise or authorise the sale of alcohol.

2.2 In terms of procedure, both the letter and Notice of Hearing have been sent to the licence holder.

3. Determination

- 3.1 At its Hearing the Board may, after giving
 - the licence holder concerned and
 - such other persons as they consider appropriate an opportunity to be heard and
 - if satisfied that it is necessary to do so for the purposes of any of the licensing objectives, make an order to:
 - a) revoke the licence;
 - b) suspend the licence for a maximum 6 month period as the Board considers appropriate; or
 - c) endorse the licence. (an endorsement expires after five years)
- 3.2 It is also open to the Board to take no further action.

3.3 If, at the Hearing, the Board is satisfied that, having regard to the licensing objectives, the licence holder is not a fit and proper person to be the holder of a personal licence then the Board must make an order revoking the licence.

4. Recommendations

4.1 Members are asked to consider whether they wish to revoke, suspend, endorse the licence or take no further action; and

4.2 Note that if a determination is made that the licence holder is not a fit and proper person to be the holder of the personal licence then the Board has no discretion as to which action it wishes to take as it must, in law, revoke the licence.

The Chief Constable hereby reports to the Licensing Board in terms of Section 84A of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 that Demi Leigh Hynes, has acted in a manner which is inconsistent with the licensing objective(s) articulated at Section 4(1) of Act, namely:

- Preventing Crime and Disorder
- Preventing Public Nuisance

History of Personal Licence Holder:

Demi Leigh Hynes, is the Premises Manager for The Imperial, 18 Queensberry Street, Dumfries.

She was granted her Personal Liquor Licence by the Scottish Borders Board, SB/LIQ/12876 on the 10 December 2019.

Demi is currently in the process of changing her name by deed pole to Demi Hadfield-Carney.

Sunday 6 February 2022

On Sunday 6 February 2022 Demi Hynes has been within the Imperial Bar consuming alcohol with a number of friends, including her current partner. During the course of the evening Demi's partner seriously assaulted another male customer within the public bar.

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About 2240 hours, same date, a member of bar staff has called last orders and began clearing up and asking customers to finish their drinks. At this time Demi Hynes has begun helping clear tables and asking customers to finish their drinks so that she could lock up.

Demi Hynes has approached the table where the victim of the assault has been seated and asked them to finish their drink and leave. Due to them having been seated at the table next to Demi throughout the evening the male has become argumentative and stated he would leave when he was finished his drink. Demi was in possession of the radio link to Police and requested their assistance due to the male refusing to leave.

Whilst waiting on the arrival of Police Demi Hynes has become involved in an argument with the male refusing to leave at which time her partner has pushed him before punching him in the face causing him to fall onto the ground.

On the arrival of Police about 2250 hours they observed a male with facial injuries holding wipes to his face which was covered in blood. Officers have then been approached by Demi Hynes who identified herself as the Premises Manager of the premises. When asked what had occurred she informed officers that she had been within her flat upstairs at the time of the assault and had not witnessed anything. Demi was requested at this time to show attending officers the CCTV footage however she informed them that it was not working.

Witnesses within the premises have then been spoken to and stated that Demi Hayes had been present when the assault occurred and had been drinking all evening within the premises in the company of the male responsible. Demi Hynes was spoken to again however continued to deny knowing the male and stated she had never seen him before or had any knowledge of his identity.

Demi was again requested to show Police Officers the CCTV footage at which time she stated that it was in fact working however she would have to call in another member of staff to access the footage.

A short time later another member of staff attended at the premises and allowed officers to view the CCTV footage of the incident.

CCTV Evidence

The CCTV footage clearly shows Demi in the company of the male responsible throughout the evening and also identified her as being present at the time of the assault. Prior to the arrival of Police Demi can be seen to get the suspect to leave the premises out of the side exit door.

Demi was again given the opportunity to provide the details of the incident to Police however continued to deny knowing the suspect or having witnesses the assault. She was then shown the CCTV footage and admitted to being in the male's company however continued to deny knowing who he was.

Witness statements were later obtained which identified the male suspect as the boyfriend of Demi Hynes.

Demi was asked by Police Officers why she had been carrying out work related tasks whilst she was off duty and under the influence of alcohol at which time she became argumentative and stated she had not been working. It was explained that she had put herself on duty by collecting glasses, asking customers to leave with the intention of locking and cashing up at the end of the night.

When staff members on duty were spoken to they confirmed that Demi Hynes would be locking and cashing up at the end of their shift.

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In summary Demi Hynes attempted to obstruct Police in their investigations in to a serious assault. She denied being present or knowing the identity of the offender who has now been identified as her partner. Initially stated that the CCTV was not working then stated that it was however required another member of staff to work it. Was observed to help the male responsible leave the premises prior to Police arrival.

Although she was off duty at the time of the incident she put herself on duty within the premises by carrying out work related tasks which has been confirmed by other members of staff.

In terms of Section 83(5)(a) and (b) of the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005 and having regard to preventing crime and disorder and preventing public nuisance objectives Police Scotland recommend that the Licensing Board take appropriate action towards Demi Hynes Personal Licence status.

LICENSING (SCOTLAND) ACT 2005: APPLICATION FOR MAJOR VARIATION OF PREMISES LICENCE PREMISES: THE DOUGLAS ARMS, 75 FRIARS VENNEL, DUMFRIES, DG1 2RQ.

- 1. This application has been submitted by Lesley Ross, looking to amend the operating plan relating to the 'Douglas Arms' Public House, situated at 75 Friars Vennel, Dumfries.
- 2. These premises are a long established and traditional town centre 'pub, with a reputation for serving a wide selection of beer, ales, and wine.
- 3. The premises are popular with a wide range of customers and are commonly referred to as being the "Dougie" or the "Dougie Arms."
- 4. The licensed premises consist of a terraced town centre building, surrounded by various other commercial retail outlets and residential properties. The bar occupies the ground floor of a three-storey building.
- 5. When the current Licence Holder took over the running of the premises, she inherited a 'pub with a basic operating plan and only minimum permitted activities. This application has been submitted to cater for customer demand and to improve the overall visitor experience of patrons visiting the premises.
- 6. This application seeks to make various changes including the adding of 'off-sales' between 10.00 to 22.00 hrs, Monday to Saturday and between 11.00 and 22.00 hrs on Sundays.
- 7. Other changes include extending the current licensed hours for 'on sales' to 01.00 hrs daily with a with a further change to Sunday opening, to start from 11.00 hrs.
- 8. The applicant also seeks to increase the capacity from 60 to 80 persons. This was possible by the removal of bench seating and the creation of recessed seating, plus the addition of outdoor table space.

Although the Douglas Arms is fairly a small 'pub, it can house 72 people indoors comfortably with space for 8 people outside, weather permitting.

- 9. Further reference is made to operating according to seasonal demand to read *'utilise any variations for example, Christmas and New Year holiday dates.'*
- 10. Other changes include the adding of 'Meeting and Conference Facilities, Bar Meals, Receptions, Club or other group meetings, Recorded Music, Live Performances, Dance Facilities, Theatre, Films, Gaming, Indoor/Outdoor Sports, Televised Sport, and Outdoor Drinking both within and outwith core licensed hours.'

Add Adult Entertainment within core licensed hours only

- 11. 'Outwith Core Licensed Hours' amend wording to read 'Activities also to be provided outside core licensed hours on rare/extraordinary occasions when meeting or conference facilities, or receptions e.g., funeral teas, are required before normal opening times. Activities/entertainments to be provided if required at these pre-arranged events/bookings only.'
- 12. The applicant is also changing the terms, times, and parts of the premises where children and young persons are permitted access.
- 13. The application is self-explanatory and unlikely to cause any issues, problems or concerns locally although the Licensee must ensure that the peace and privacy of neighbouring domestic properties are not jeopardised in any way by the playing of live or recorded music.
- 14. The applicant is the holder of a personal licence and is well respected in the local hospitality sector (DG/N0912 refers.)
- 15.1 am satisfied that the extent of this application is not excessive and in keeping with the character of the premises.

The increased capacity is not excessive, and the additional operating hours applied for is within policy and brings the Douglas Arms into line with other licensed premises in the town centre.
