How the School Works

Class Organisation

For organisational purposes, schools are structured into classes. Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher to organise the class structure.

All classes within the school are multi composite. Wherever possible we try not to split any year group. Currently there are 15 pupils in P1-3, 15 pupils in P4/5 and 15 in P6/7 but this varies from year to year. Pupils are also supervised in the playground by a minimum of 2 teachers or learning assistants.

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Our positive behaviour policy has recently been reviewed and updated. Full details can be found on the school website. Weekly assemblies celebrate wider achievement and certificates are awarded to individual pupils when they demonstrate great effort in their learning. Children also celebrate house points for carrying out our school rules well; giving them a sense of teamwork and shared success. Parents are notified weekly of all our successes and celebrations of learning are shared with the wider community through film and photo.





School uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. For more information on School Uniform, Dress Code, and School Clothing Grants visit www.dumgal.gov.uk

Wearing school uniform encourages a sense of belonging and pride in our school. It should also reflect that school is a place of work therefore more casual attire will be actively discouraged. In line with the Education Authority's Policy we do have a dress code and expect parents/carers to support this.

Our school colour is navy and the children are requested to wear:

- Navy/skirt/pinafore/trousers
- White or navy poloshirt/shirt/tie
- Navy or black footwear
- Navy school sweatshirt/cardigan

The school has a small supply of uniform and additional orders can be placed prior to the summer holidays.

We have a healthy stock of 'as new' donated uniform

which is available free of charge and in line with our Eco/Recycling ethos.

An indoor and outdoor PE kit should be brought to school each term with a pair of trainers. Jewellery should be kept to a minimum and hair should be tied back before participating in P.E.

Pupils should change into indoor footwear on arrival each day.

School Clothing grants

School Meals

Pre-ordering lunch

All menus are nutritionally analysed, offering a fantastic choice and flexibility. Primary schools have introduced an advanced pre order system for lunch. Pre order forms are handed out to all pupils.

Special dietary requirements

Specific meals for children with food allergy and intolerances, medically prescribed diets, or diets for religious or cultural reasons, may be catered for. Ask the school for a registration form or call 030 33 33 3000 and ask for Facilities Operations (Catering). We recommend that all children with a food allergy or intolerance register even if your child does not have school meals.

Free School Meals

Free School Meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3 and 4. Primary 5 pupils will be entitled to Free School Meals from January 2022 and Primary 6 and 7 pupils will all be entitled to Free School Meals from August 2022.

Roll out of online payments for school meals to Primary 5, 6 and 7 parents / pupils will be rolled out to all schools in Dumfries and Galloway Schools from 30 August 2021. Younger children at nursery or older pupils at primary may also be eligible for free school meals in certain situations as well as those families on qualifying benefits. In Nursery eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare.

As part of this funded offer the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

At Hutton Primary we always endeavour to establish good relationships and promote positive behaviour. The aim of our positive behaviour policy is to state the agreed principles, which form the basis for the schools practices and policy for Behaviour Management i.e. the setting and attaining of acceptable standards within the school. Discipline in school is concerned

with the personal and social development of individual pupil values, beliefs, and attitudes, therefore cannot be undertaken by school alone but must be shared by pupils, parents and staff.

Learner achievements relate to all aspects of their planned learning. At Hutton, pupils are given recognition for a range of achievements which help the pupils understand the skills and attributes they have developed.

We celebrate success and personal achievements through certificates and awards assemblies and 'celebrations of learning' offering parents the opportunity to come to school and see first-hand learning experiences. Pupils' profiles recognise achievement both in and out of school.

Recognising Achievement

"All children and young people are entitled to have the full range of their achievements recognised and to be supported in reflecting and building on their learning and achievements. Schools and other establishments will provide opportunities for learners to achieve and encourage team to participate."

Building the Curriculum 5

Curriculum for Excellence recognises how valuable achievements are and how significant they are in a child's life. Together it is important that we develop skills for learning, life and work. Such skills might include being responsible, being creative, time keeping, problem solving, planning, negotiating a wide range of organisational skills and social skills.

In recognition of your child's wider achievements, a display will be created in school and their wider achievement celebrated at the weekly assembly, giving your child the opportunity to reflect on their achievement.

- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Our current policy is to offer effective homework which should complement work done in class. In general P1-3 homework will cover reading, spelling and occasionally they may undertake independent research for topics. A range of tasks will be set each term through a homework jigsaw with activities linked to pupils' learning experiences in class. Pupils are afforded the choice of homework activities.

We would appreciate your co-operation in

- Ensuring that the task is completed neatly
- Giving your child help and support when needed
- Encouraging without pressuring
- Checking with your child 'TEAMS' and assisting as required to upload pupil's work

Due to current circumstances we are encouraging all our pupils to access their homework activities though Microsoft Teams.

If at any time your child experiences difficulties with their homework or accessing Teams please inform the school. Your child should never feel pressurised to complete the task.

School Improvements

Each year the school will publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward. In May/June of each year, the school publishes a Standards & Quality Report. The first part of this report provides an overview of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities, while the second part gives information about, for example, how well pupils are learning and achieving; how well the school is supporting children/young people to develop and learn. In June, we publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. The



improvement priorities are influenced not only by the feedback and information we receive from our pupils, parents/carers and other stakeholders, but also by national improvement priorities. The plan outlines our key priorities and indicates the expected impact of these priorities on our young people. Progress and evidence towards the targets set out in the School Improvement Plan are shared through our annual Standards and Quality Report. This provides a comprehensive summary of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities and learner's achievements over the last academic year.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
