


## School Aims, Values and Ethos

### Our Vision

We value the people and rural locality of our school and strive for Springholm Primary to play a vital role within our community, enhancing the learning of all.

Our learning community is central to the education and development of all our children. We rely on the support, expertise and opportunities that come from the people involved in our school to open up prospects for every child (e.g. running community events, taking lead roles within the school, using local facilities). Through these opportunities, the children explore how their local environment expands into the wider global community and encourages them to use their skills, knowledge and attitudes to explore, think creatively and solve problems in real-life experiences. However,

learning does not stop when we leave school. The vision and values we strive for with the children also apply to the adults that are involved in the partnership. Whether staff, parents, family or friends the school is a place of encouragement and opportunity to reflect true life-long learning. In the truest sense of the words, our schools are places where we can learn and succeed together.

### Our Values

Springholm Primary aims to celebrate our rural community and value our unique features, whilst also coming together to share strengths and support the learning of every child. We enjoy close links with our parents (parent councils, supporting activities, school improvement planning), community groups (local churches, partner nurseries, local businesses) and partners (Active Schools, Queen of the South, Stewartry Rugby Club). Each relationship enhances the planned learning activities the children experience and enriches the opportunities for every child.

In consultation with our pupils, parents, staff and community we created our 5 Core Values in 2017-18 which underpins all of our activities.



These values, shared across the partnership, link our work and encourage all of our community to come together and strive for the best possible results.

Our curriculum is built upon our strong values. It considers the key principles and philosophy of Curriculum for Excellence to ensure every child experiences a broad general education. We aim to develop knowledge and skills for learning, life and work through well planned, coherent and progressive programmes and activities.

We see ourselves as a learning community and strive to include everyone (children, staff, parents & community) in our activities and learning. Everyone is encouraged to participate, achieve and grow in the best possible way and we have a very strong ethos of leadership at all levels. We are very lucky to have a talented and dedicated group of adults who are continually developing their own knowledge and skills to the benefit of all children.

## How the School Works

### Class Organisation

Class sizes are based on the Scottish Government guidelines. Being a rural school, with three teaching bases, children at Springholm School are taught in composite classes. In keeping with policy, the maximum number of children in a composite class is 25. However when allocating children to classes and deciding class sizes, the physical capacity of the learning and teaching areas and the need to accommodate any specialist equipment and mobility aids will also be considered.

Each year it is the responsibility of the Headteacher (in consultation with staff) to organise the class structure in the school. Children will be placed in composite classes with consideration given to a number of factors including:

- Learning needs
- Gender balance
- Siblings
- Age

Education Services will support any decision made by the Headteacher following these criteria. However if parents are unhappy with the class organisation, they should speak with the Headteacher in the first instance.

### Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

At Springholm we aim to provide the best possible educational outcomes and experiences for our pupils, and we recognise the close links which exist between pupils' learning and behaviour. The school is currently reviewing their Positive Relationships (including behaviour and anti-bullying) Policy in session 2019/20. This will include consultations with children, parents and staff and is being done in partnership with the schools in the Castle Douglas HS cluster and will reflect current local and national guidance and good practise.

Of particular importance is that all staff set consistently high expectations of pupils' behaviour and these are shared openly and agreed by both the pupils and their parents. We therefore see the promotion of positive behaviour in our school as a key element in enabling our pupils to meet the Scottish government outcome: that all children and young people will become successful learners, confident individuals, responsible citizens and effective contributors.

Our 5 Core Values highlight the expected behaviours that we expect from everyone in our school community. Mutual respect and good manners underpin the good behaviour and positive relationships expected from all children. Furthermore, teaching our pupils to manage their relationships with others in positive ways is also an important end in its own right. We believe that helping our pupils to acquire the ability to manage their behaviour and relationships appropriately is a key element in preparing them for life in an adult society, including the workplace.

Restorative approaches are used to support children to make positive decisions and build positive relationships. Our approaches are underpinned by Emotionworks (<https://www.emotionworks.org.uk/>) and Pivotal (<https://pivotaleducation.com>) principles which have proven effective in supporting positive relationships and behaviour management within the school.



## School uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. [www.dumgal.gov.uk](http://www.dumgal.gov.uk)

At Springholm Primary School, children are expected to dress neatly and sensibly at all times. The uniform consists of:

- White polo shirt
- Blue sweatshirt or cardigan
- Dark skirt/ trousers
- Dark shoes
- School socks/ tights

Sweatshirts, jackets, fleeces and polo shirts are available to order from the school office.

Pupils are required to have their gym kit, water bottle and an art shirt in school at all times. Please ensure that all items are clearly marked with the pupils' names.

## Suggested P.E. Kit

Should PE be outdoors, pupils will be notified in advance to bring outdoor kit.

- Plain t-shirt or school t-shirt (after consultation with pupils and parents team strips are permitted for PE / extra-curricular activities if chosen by parents)
- Plain shorts
- Socks
- Trainers/gym shoes (non-marking soles)

## Outdoor Clothing

We encourage all children to learn outdoors as much as possible. To support this we ask that all children to come to school dressed appropriately for the weather.

## School Clothing grants

## Pre-ordering lunch

All menus are nutritionally analysed, offering a fantastic choice and flexibility. Primary schools have introduced an advanced pre order system for lunch. Pre order forms are handed out to all pupils.

## Special dietary requirements

For food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin may be catered for. Ask the school for a registration form or call 030 33 33 3000 and ask for Facilities Operations (Catering)

## Free School Meals

Free School Meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2 and 3. Younger children at nursery or older pupils at primary may also be eligible for free school meals in certain situations as well as those families on qualifying benefits.

## Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

## Absence from School

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day for doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

## Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds – in nursery, primary, secondary, at college, workplace or community learning. It aims to raise standards, improve knowledge and develop skills, closing the gap between the lowest and highest performers. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

## Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

At Springholm School we plan learning experiences and outcomes across a broad general curriculum within the Curriculum for Excellence (CfE).

Underpinning all learning are the Responsibilities for All (Literacy and English (inc Modern Languages), Numeracy and Maths and Health and Well-Being). These overarching curricular areas are taught both discretely and through inter-disciplinary learning (IDL) contexts.

In recognition of the fact that the delivery of health and wellbeing is the responsibility of all, we ensure that the school works closely with partner agencies to

plan effective programmes of study in keeping with the GIRFEC well-being indicators

- Safe
- Healthy
- Achieving
- Nurtured
- Active
- Respected
- Responsible
- Included

In keeping with the Scottish Government initiative, all pupils receive an allocation of 2 hours of PE weekly

Other curricular areas are taught either as stand-alone subjects or through interdisciplinary learning. These include:

- Technologies (Including Digital Learning)
- Expressive Arts (Art, Music, Drama & Dance)
- Sciences
- Social Subjects
- Religious and Moral Education

Children have the opportunity to engage in a wide range of collaborative and investigative tasks which provide frequent opportunities for active learning. The development of the children's enquiry and creative skills forms an important element of learning and teaching within all areas of the curriculum.

Appropriate links are planned across the curriculum including opportunities for children to participate in performances and presentations in a wide range of contexts (e.g. assemblies, school concerts, class talks, competitions). This may be supported by curricular visits, guests and visitors, personal research, game based learning, problem solving and group activities.


We encourage all children to explore their own interests and strengths through wider achievements in and out of school. These are celebrated regularly through weekly assemblies, displays, newsletters etc. A programme of events are planned each year to give the children a range of experiences that they may wish to take further outside of school through extra-curricular and personal activities.

## Religious and Moral Education

RME has a statutory position in primary schools in Scottish education. It is taught within whole-school weekly assemblies and our programme of study within the school which fosters an awareness of the beliefs, values and issues and practices and traditions within Christianity and other world religions.

## Times for Reflection

As part of our annual programme we plan at least 6 opportunities for the children to explore wider issues (forgiveness, friendship, resolutions etc.). These sessions, through assemblies and class lessons, are supported by our local ministers, churches and religious groups. Our programme is reviewed annually.



## Home/School Partnership/Parental Involvement and Engagement

### Parent Council and Parent Forum

Every parent who has a child at our school is a member of the Parent Forum. The parent council is a group of parents who have chosen to represent the parent forum. As a member of the Parent Forum, each parent can expect to:

- Receive information about the school and its activities
- Hear about what partnership with parents means in our school
- Be invited to be involved in ways and times that suit you
- Identify issues you want the parent council to work on with the school
- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides
- Work in partnership with staff
- Enjoy taking part in school life in whatever way possible

### Homework/Family Learning

Within the Partnership, we understand that parents / families / carers are the main educators of their child / children from birth onwards. All the things parents do with their children can be described as educational in that they will learn how to behave around others, learn / practice / perform skills and adapt to situations based on parental guidance.

These activities can include:

- Visiting a place of interest like a museum, library, theatre or cinema
- Playing a game or using a computer together
- Visiting friends and relatives; going shopping together, going to a café / restaurant.
- Choosing own or public library books to read to and with their children
- Providing opportunities to develop skills in a sport, art or other hobby and / or
- Encouraging co-operative and constructive play with other children.
- Attending special events like concerts, exhibitions and festivals

These are all valuable learning experiences for children and can properly be called "learning at home", in this case home-directed learning. Educational research indicates that is often more beneficial to overall attainment in the long-term to do these types of things than to do extra academic work.

We understand the importance of family and leisure time. We believe that well-designed school-directed learning, working alongside home directed learning, has a cumulative and beneficial long-term effect on pupil attainment.

### How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.

## School Improvements

In May/June of each year, the school publishes a Standards & Quality Report providing all stakeholders with a comprehensive summary of the school's work and learners' achievements over the last year. The first part of this report provides an overview of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities, while the second part gives information about, for example, how well pupils are learning and achieving; how well the school is supporting children/young people to develop and learn. In June, we publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents.

Each year, the school publishes a School Improvement, Progress and Standards & Quality Report providing all stakeholders with a comprehensive summary of the school's work and learners' achievements over the last year.

The first part of this report provides an overview of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities, while the second part gives information about, for example, how well pupils are learning and achieving; how well the school is supporting children/young people to develop and learn. We work with our Partnership and Cluster schools to create and publish a Partnership Improvement Plan. This outlines the key priorities for individual schools as well as the Partnership during the year ahead, following due consultation with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected

impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward. Both are available in appendices in this handbook or in hard copy on request.

## Health and Safety

### Emergency Procedures

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

### Severe Weather and School Closure Arrangements

Headteachers are authorised to make an emergency closure when the state of the weather or any other exceptional circumstance make it necessary in the best interests of the pupils. In these circumstances parents will be communicated with in a variety of ways including text messages/ phone calls and emergency contact arrangements. All school closures will be notified on the Council Website.
