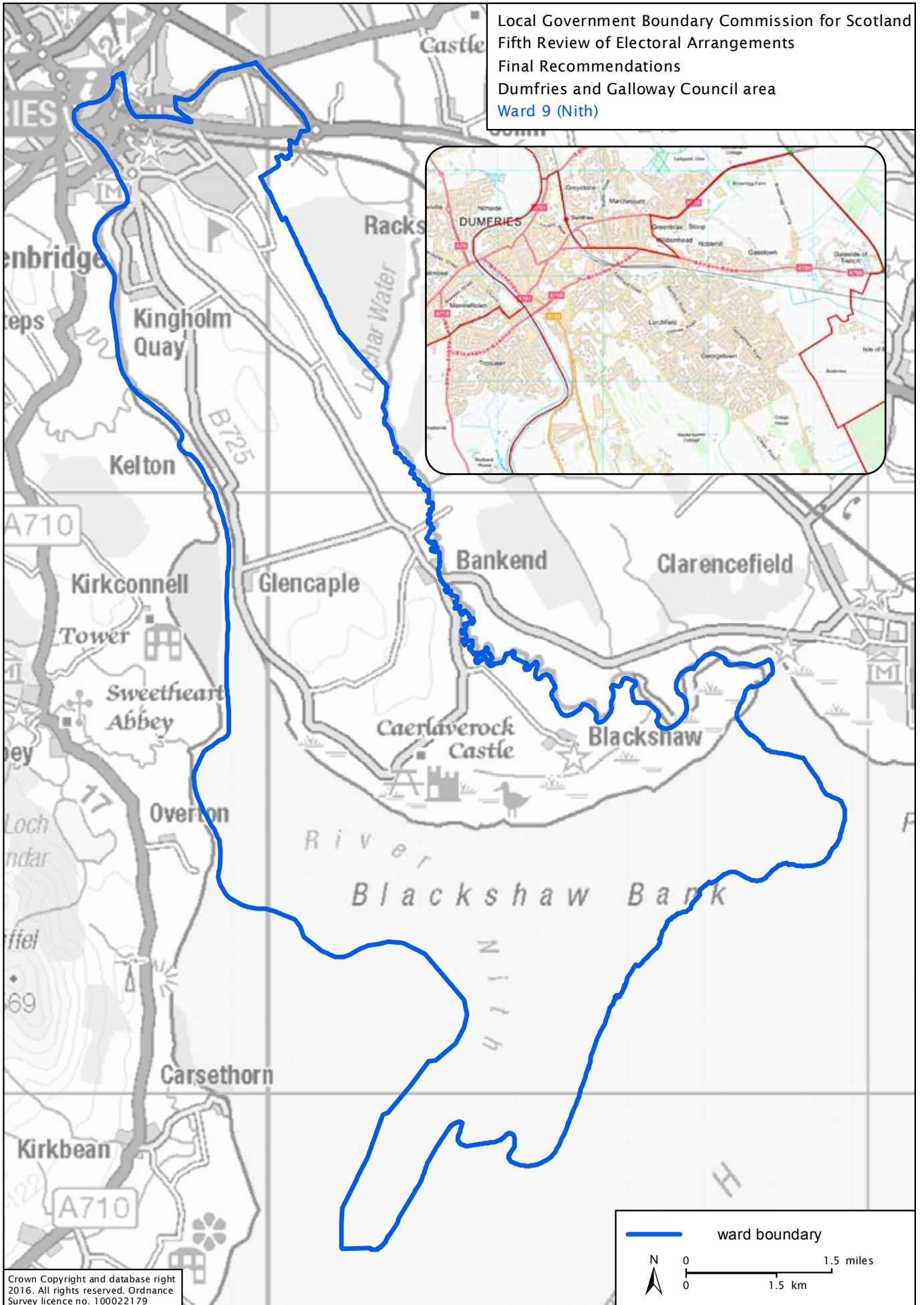

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Key statistics - Main Settlements

Some details about the main towns and villages in the Nith Ward are given below:

Dumfries is identified as the Regional Capital within the Dumfries Housing Market Area, with a population of approximately 32,000. The town is well located and easily accessible to the strategic road system at the junctions of the A75, A76, A701 and A709 around the Dumfries bypass. Further afield the town can access the A74 (M) 11 miles to the east via the strategic road network. The town is also accessible by rail on the Nith Valley Line between Glasgow and Carlisle. The settlement serves as the main administrative, shopping and health care centre for the region providing amongst other things, a range of employment and education opportunities, leisure facilities and housing options. Dumfries is an attractive market town with an original medieval core which attracts tourists and visitors and has conservation area status. The tidal River Nith flows through the town providing an attractive feature and setting, however the river also results in a number of areas of flood risk within and around the town.

Dumfries Town Centre: The Town Centre Housing Renewal programme for Queen street has now completed and the work for Friars Vennel has begun, assisting in making improvements to the environment, fabric and appearance of these town centre fringe areas. Work is also underway to rationalise the three town centre conservation areas into one combined character appraisal.

Glencaple is identified as a Local Centre within the Dumfries Housing Market Area. The village lies to the south of Dumfries on the B725, fronting the Nith Estuary. The village contains a number of services including a primary school and a community shop and café. The village is within the Nith Estuary National Scenic Area (NSA) and is situated on the shores of the Upper Solway Flats and Marshes SSSI and the Solway European Marine Site.

Caerlaverock and the surrounding area is home to about 400 people. Included in the estate are the two main villages of Glencaple and Bankend, lying on either side of dramatic, tree-topped 'Wardlaw,' site of an ancient, hill-top fort commanding splendid views over the Solway Merse. Each village has its own identity and its own unique role to play in the community

Key Partner Organisation Projects

Public Health Improvement

The Public Health Improvement (PHI) workforce is part of the Community Health and Social Care Directorate. One PHI team works regionally, in partnership with Health and Social Care, Third Sector, Local Authority and communities to agree strategic direction and lead on action to deliver a regional plan to improve population health and wellbeing. With a focus on reducing health inequalities, the regional PHI plan includes poverty and inequalities; food insecurity; mental health and wellbeing; tobacco, alcohol and drug use prevention and harm reduction; physical activity/re-ablement; diet and healthy weight; housing and homelessness; workplace health; children and young people's health and wellbeing; digital equality.

All other PHI practitioners are being located within 8 Home Teams developing across the region and will be focusing activity on early intervention and prevention with vulnerable communities and individuals; delivering and developing the Community Link Service; proactively engaging with colleagues, communities and partners to build and strengthen a 'community led' regional approach to PHI using community development methodology; and providing support for specific actions within the PHI Regional Plan and priority PHI issues.

NHS Home Teams

Home Teams will be fully integrated, multi-disciplinary teams placed at the heart of the community who will work closely with people, their family, friends, carers and the wider local community and services to enable people to live

healthy and active lives and live at home for longer.

They will support people within their community to live at home, close to their home or in a homely setting, preventing hospital admission where appropriate or safely bring them home from hospital earlier. A "Home First" approach is the default position for everyone. Home Teams will also ensure that people are at the heart of any decisions and will encourage people to improve and maintain their health and wellbeing through good conversations.

Dynamically Different Dumfries is the outcome of a new approach to community led regeneration with the community actively working with the Council, its partners and Elected Members to ensure that everyone in Dumfries who wants to can have a say in the future of their town. In developing the priorities for Dynamically Different Dumfries 5 key vision drivers have been identified. These vision drivers imagine the quality of Dumfries as a place to: Live and Belong, Work, Learn and do Business, Access, be Active and Green, and Grow and Play.

The Crichton Trust – '21st Century Village'

In partnership with Dumfries and Galloway Council, we will deliver a full and detailed masterplan for The Crichton Quarter/ 21st Century Village in line with the Local Development Plan 2 which seeks to dovetail the Ladyfield Housing Site into The Crichton Estate. The work will include design options and costing for: housing, a community-owned non-carbon local energy scheme, design,

feasibility and costing of a pedestrian and cyclists priority zone for The Crichton Quarter and design considerations for the use of autonomous vehicles and assisting living technologies across what will become a Living Lab Innovation Quarter in partnership with the University of Glasgow and Heriot-Watt University. All will benefit from the co-location of Scotland's first rural 5G Innovation Centre due to be announced 26 May 2021.

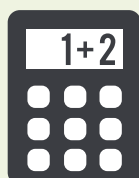
